Don't feel like your child needs to define all of these characteristics. Work on creating a puppet as you talk about the character. You can make a puppet using a sock, a paper bag, a cardboard tube. Be creative!

## **Puppet Show**



### Stage:

Table with a blanket or table cloth

#### Set:

- Talk about where your play should take place. Is it hot or cold?
   Real or pretend? Someplace you have been or somewhere you want to go?
- Design the set using cardboard, markers, and paint

### Props:

- Pretend food
- Clothes and accessories
- Household items and toys
- Make your own if you don't have it

#### Make Believe:

- Play and pretend
- Have fun and be silly
- The story doesn't have to make sense
- Ask the following questions to help build a plot and clarify your child's thinking:
  - O What happens next?
  - O How does that character feel?
  - O What would happen if ... ?
  - o How can we solve the problem?
